


### CHICLANA C.F.

Chiclana Football Club was founded in 1948 and have played in the lower divisions in Spain since then. They currently play in the Honour Division Andalucia Group 1, the 6th tier in Spain. The past two seasons have brought more success, just missing out on promotion each season. This season they have also won the Copa de Andalucia which gave them a first round cup tie in the Kings Cup against CF Osasuna from the Premier League, they also played Villareal CF at the same stage last season. They lost both games to their superior opposition but it was a great occasion in Chiclana with both games played in front of packed houses here in town. Chiclana are once more pushing hard for promotion and with just a few games left are currently top of the league, they also have a thriving under age section. Home games are played in the Municipal Stadium just opposite the bus station in Chiclana. Plans have been drawn up to upgrade the stadium. Home games kick off usually at noon on Sundays, if you enjoy a game, then come along and support the team in white.

#### SEASONAL TIPS FOR GARDENERS

Spring is sprung, the grass is riz. I would go on about the boids, but to be frank they can be a bit disappointing. The sparrows are always there, the swallows are building, but what else is there? A couple of doves, a couple of Sardinian warblers scuttling furtively thru the undergrowth, and something small in the bushes that goes "Tizzzittt tizzzittt" but since the damn thing never shows itself, I can't even identify it. True, if it is a good year the bee eaters take up residence in the field at the back, but that's about the best of it

So, I am left with my plants. This year the rain has been a bit of an expletive deleted. I planted up a whole lot of chilli seedlings, sunflowers, marigolds and have been eagerly waiting for the day I can put them out. Trouble is, with the rain HAMMERING down, the seedlings would be smashed flat in an instant, but while they are in the greenhouse they get more and more etiolated which frankly is just as bad. Today was going to be the last rain for two weeks, and then tonight on the weather app I see that next week has three wet days. That rules out putting the adeniums out; though the air plants and Phalaenopsis could stand that, the next week is so cold at night that I daren't risk it.



I have my experimental sweet potato towers out. The preliminary results last year have been yielding a heavy return, so I am curious to see what this year will bring with more organised, heavy planting. The towers lift all the vines well up into the air so that the ground between the plants is kept weed free very easily, and the temptation is to plant chillies alongside the sweet potatoes to get a freebie crop. I think I will succumb, as long as I can get them out before they are too etiolated

The sweet potatoes come with an irritating catch. Beginning of January I potted up all the small sweet potatoes and so far ONE has decided to shoot. ONE out of 30 or 40 pots. I realised I was going to have problems, when I realised I had missed out on an easy way to propagate them by simply taking vine cuttings. Trouble is, at the beginning of the winter we had had two slight frosts which burned all the vines, so I was desperately running around seeking out vines that were putting out fresh leaves. These were all cut into suitable lengths and stood in glasses full of water, and every week I would pull the ones out that were rooting, and pot them up. They were then left in the cold greenhouse until they showed enough development to withstand the big wide world whereupon they were put outside in the full sun, and this week I planted out the first batch of 24 plants. Fingers crossed.



Next year I will take vine cuttings way earlier, before the first frosts, although that will mean baby sitting them in the greenhouse for 4 months. Given that Spain is supposed to be a sunny country, it never ceases to surprise me that I have the main greenhouse closed with the heaters ready for 5-6 months of the year.

Out in the countryside, this has definitely been the year of the Bermuda Buttercup, with tremendous displays of yellow flowers all over. It is almost as though most years have a favoured flower that grows 10 x more lavishly than any other. One year it was the Suya, the red clover. It was SO prolific that it was all over the central reservations of the motorway, and when it came to an end, the workmen were clearing it using a mini combine harvester which left a necklace of small compressed bales of dried

to stand up straight.

Suya all along the motorway. I assume they used it as animal feedstuff. Another year it was the Suegras, which coloured whole fields so that the cattle looked to be standing in lakes of blue paint, and it turned the olive groves into weird Alice in Wonderland images. Thankfully, the *Ayuntamiento*, or whoever is responsible for verge maintenance and the like, because they don't use herbicide and cut the weeds back late in the year, together with the impoverished soils and no fertiliser run-off, ensures that the grasses are sparse and the wildflowers do well, year on year.
